The Epworth Education Trust was created in November 2020 when two smaller academy trusts - Wesley Trust, consisting of three schools, and Acorn Trust, consisting of two schools, merged to create the foundations for a Multi-Academy Trust where schools work collaboratively to be the very best that they can be.

We passionately believe, however, that does not mean every school needs to be the same. Our schools are reflections of their communities, and that is an important connection that should not be challenged or lost.

We are also an inclusive trust that welcomes a wide range of schools including Methodist and community schools, primary, secondary and special schools that are both convertor and sponsored academies.

Given our belief that we should support all children in all schools, we will also be working with schools that are seen to be strong in the eyes of Ofsted, but also those facing challenges.

Our hope is that, over time, all Methodist schools across the country will join us. Schools will be allocated into "hubs" so that really close-knit families of Methodist schools can work together in each region.

MAKING AN IMPACT

Our approach is not just about ensuring the highest of education standards, it is about ensuring our children are happy, healthy and ready for the world that awaits them.

Just as an example of some of the recent stories: Health and Wellbeing

Bedford Hall Methodist Primary School achieved the 'Teach Well Gold Award' in July 2020. The award is provided to schools who have taken exceptional care of the physical and mental wellbeing of their staff through the COVID 19 pandemic

In addition the school has Young Mental Health Ambassadors, who champion health and wellbeing and help peers in making healthy lifestyle choices that affect mental health. The Mental Health Ambassadors have developed their knowledge and understanding of key physical, social and mental health issues affecting them today through working with an athlete mentor.

Reading at the heart of the Trust

The Trust always invests in reading. Recently children at Nutgrove Methodist Primary School have had a significant boost to their library as a new reading scheme was rolled out across our school.

In addition, how reading is taught has also evolved during lockdown. Pupils at Westleigh Methodist Primary School, for example, enjoyed lockdown story time so much, where the teachers recorded themselves reading a book for children to listen to at home, it has now become a permanent fixture in all the classrooms – which has inspired pupils to explore exciting new genres of books.

In addition, Year 6 prefects conducted their own story time sessions by recording videos of themselves reading books for Years 1 and 2.

National Awards Recognise the value of our Staff

Zoe Leyland from Summerseat Methodist Primary School has been shortlisted for a Pearson Teaching Award - known as the 'Oscars of the Education Sector' - as the New Teacher of the Year.

Zoe joined the school in June 2020 – and has been fundamental in reshaping the school with her enthusiasm, passion and dedication.

We believe passionately in the importance of local governance in each of our schools. Governors are a vital link between the school's community, the school and trustees – and the feedback and guidance that comes from Local Governance is both valued and valuable.

In a Trust, however, governance structure is different – and we use that to work to empower and define the roles of governance at every level of our organisation.

Members

The line that is most commonly used about members is that they are "eyes on and hands off" meaning that while the operational side of Governance is handled by the Governing Bodies and Trustees, they take a very strategic overview. They also:

- Approve the Trust accounts and appoint the auditors.
- Appoint Trustees.

This group once a year annually and has a small number of annual statutory functions to carry out.

Trustees

The Trustees have a range of powers and responsibilities which they are legally required to carry out, working in close partnership with the Chief Executive Officer and the central team to ensure that the academies provide the best possible education for all students and comply fully with the Academies Financial Handbook.

The Trust Board considers the vision and aims of Epworth and its schools, as well as strategy and policy to deliver its key objectives. It has ultimate responsibility for all budgets, salaries and safeguarding.

Local Governance

Each school has Local Governance, known as a local advisory board, which enables it to focus on the performance and scrutiny of teaching and learning; student behaviour, attendance, safety and wellbeing; and community relations.

Good governance is about creating a true partnership between all three layers to champion, support and challenge each school. Our support services are growing and strengthening so that as a Trust we have capacity and capability to allow our headteachers to focus on what matters most – teaching and learning, and the happiness of the staff and children in their school.

To support this the Trust offers:
